Recipient of the Micky Chadbourne Scholarship ... **ALYSSA MCLAUGHLIN**



The Italian person who has made the most significant impact on me is my grandpa, Carmine Pesce Jr. He led by example and always considered others when he made decisions. One of the things that made the biggest impact on me was my grandpa's strong work ethic. He got his first job when he was 12, setting up pins at a bowling alley on Congress Street, and worked until the end of his life when he was 81. On days I spent at my grandparents house I always watched him get up in the morning and go to work without any complaints. I remember him jokingly saying "The only thing worse than having a job, is not having one". My grandpa always encouraged me to pursue my education, he often said "get an education, get a job, be responsible!".

Another way my grandpa made an impact on me was seeing him maintain an active, structured life. He especially loved going to the Italian Heritage Club. He tried a variety of different activities there, but his favorites were playing cards, chorus, bocce, trivia, Italian language classes and Italian movie night. My grandpa loved the people at the club and he loved the socialization of it. Another one of his favorite activities was going for long walks, even in his 70's he would walk five miles a day. Seeing how much my grandpa enjoyed being active and having a structured life has motivated me to do the same.

In addition to his active lifestyle, my grandpa always ate really healthy. He would eat three hearty meals every day. It started with Raisin Bran for breakfast, then my grandma Arlene would put together a lunch for him to take to work every day. It was always the same thing, a sandwich with an apple, an orange, and a banana. So much fiber! My grandma loved to cook and she was amazing at it so my grandpa always ate homemade meals for dinner. Seeing how they were both happy to eat robust, nutritious meals showed me how important it is to eat well and made me want to do the same for myself.

The most important manner in which my grandpa affected me was seeing how much he loved the life he built in Portland with my grandma Arlene. He is a marital role model to me because he sustained a marriage for 55 years and I hope to do the same someday. Although my grandpa was tremendously sad following the death of Arlene, having his family and his friends at the club helped with his loneliness and extended his life. He liked having all his friends and family near, the familiar area was really comforting to him. He loved living on Washington Ave, he loved his job at Hub Furniture, and he loved doing things with his family at the Italian Heritage Club. Overall, my grandpa made a huge impact on me in so many different positive ways and I'm so grateful for the time I got to spend with him.

Recipient of The Dominic and Linda Reali Scholarship ... **MARYKATE EARLEY**



When I was about seven years old, my grandfather, Ed or Papa, told me the story of the bean truck. Essentially, this story is about a truck that picked up neighborhood kids in the Little Italy section of Portland and took them to work on a bean farm. The kids with the best work ethic were allowed to continually go and work at the bean farm, where the less motivated kids were not put on the truck the next day and were replaced by another child willing to give their best try.

After the sudden death of his father when he was fourteen, my grandfather became the supporter for his mother and two sisters, while still managing going to high school. He worked throughout school and graduated from Cheverus High School in 1961. He went to SMCC and began to work at IBM in Providence, Rhode Island after he married my grandmother in 1966. He worked his fair share of hours when my mom and aunts were growing up so that my grandmother could be there with the three of them. He was able to retire back home to Maine in 1991, where to this day he continually volunteers with the Holy Name Society, St. Vincent de Paul Soup Kitchen, and the Boys and Girls Club.

Looking into the entire Italian community in Portland, every person shares this similar work ethic. As a lifetime parishioner of St. Peter's Church, I have noticed as the years have passed how hard working each person is at every event. During the week leading up to the St. Rocco's Bazaar, there are countless people that contribute towards the many hours it takes to host a successful Bazaar. Many individuals that I have met in this community are successful entrepreneurs and tradesmen, who found their success from hard work.

Throughout my eighteen years, Papa has been one of the most influential people in my life. With countless words of wisdom, ticks of advice, and moral stories, I have been able to use these in situations that I encounter every day. The most prevalent story the one about the bean truck--has stuck with me the most because it has taught me that one of the major things a person needs to have to be successful is a strong work ethic. From experience, Papa's strong work ethic has given him, and likely other Italian members of the community, the successful life that is greatly deserved. Papa was one of those kids to earn his spot on the bean truck and he has always motivated me to earn my spot as well.



Recipient of The Germani Family Scholarship ... **PATRICIA CIAMPI**

Louie "Doc" Ciampi ... My grandfather, Louis Ciampi, has been one of the biggest influences on who I am today. From large family gatherings every Saturday evening to his compassion in tending to the sick, he has taught me many things. Most importantly he has taught me the value of family, to be compassionate, and to be present.

Since beyond what I can remember, all of my aunts, uncles, cousins, parents, brothers, and grandparents, would get together every Saturday after mass at St. Peter's. He would make homemade pasta and meatballs, accompanied with a caesar salad and a few desserts baked by my grandmother and namesake, Patricia. Rain or shine, everyone was there and welcomed. There was never once a time that I felt I had overstayed my invitation or was being any sort of burden, which is saying something because I was there just about every day. He put all of us before himself with no fail and he taught me to make time for family no matter how crazy or dysfunctional life gets.

My grandfather taught me to be compassionate. His office doors were always open to anyone who needed help, day or night. The way that he cared for so many people, so genuinely inspired me to go into nursing. I truly hope that one day I can foster as much love and grace as he did. It always struck me that he could care so genuinely for so many people, not only his own patients and family but complete strangers.

He taught me the lesson of being present. In life, we tend to get caught up in the specifics, the superficial, the unimportant things so much so that we forget to cherish each moment. We forget to live in each instant instead of worrying about the previous or the next one. He showed me that we have to be conscious about every experience that we have. When he was in hospice care and I was in between hospitalizations, we went to visit him as a family and this visit felt like something bigger was happening, bigger than all of us and all that we could ever truly understand. Everyone was getting their turn to talk to him, saying their goodbyes as we neared the end. At one point, most of the people in the room decided to go get some lunch, and it was my turn to talk to him. It was the first time that I had seen him in the hospice house, and he seemed much more peaceful than he had in the hospital ICU. I got to talk to him about everything that was going with my own hospitalizations and how I was going to miss him so much. I remember telling him that I love him and that it was okay to let go, that we would be okay if it meant he wasn't going to suffer anymore and that I would be with him as much as I possibly could. Looking me right in the eyes he took one last big breath and I noticed a change in him. I called for one of the nurses and she gathered my family around to say a prayer and to be with him. In those last moments I saw my family as together as they have ever been, completely there and present for one another; that was his final lesson and I try my hardest to apply it to my life every single day.





Recipient of the Dominic and Linda Real Scholarship ... **MADISON MITCHELL**

Summer days filled with working on a tan at the beach, a deep appreciation for Dean Martin and Tony Soprano, recounting old stories heard a million times before, and knowing no sauce will ever be as good as Ma's. All things essential to my Italian heritage.

Ever since I was a little kid, my Uncle Tony (Grassi, not Soprano, though he wishes he was the latter) has trained me to have a profound gratitude for our Italian heritage. My training started with the story of my great-grandparents and the struggles they endured traveling to America. They were the first of the Grassi's to make the trek; their bravery and determination

instilled pride into our family as we too try to embody these qualities.

The next step is the St Peter's Italian Bazaar where attendance is mandatory. The festival is essentially a family reunion. When I was out with friends here, they would continuously ask "How many cousins do you have?". It does not matter whether someone is my first cousin or seventh cousin; everyone is a cousin. The bazaar imparts a sense of faith and community within our family; not only are we grateful for each other, but we are also grateful for the culture that links us together.

The final step is to go home to Italy. In July 2017, I left with the Italian Heritage Center to Lettomanoppello, Venice, Florence, and Rome for two weeks. The time before our departure, Uncle Tony would have us over for dinner to tell stories of when he went home. His love for the food, fascination with The David, and overwhelming sense of familiarity with the country made my excitement and anticipation grow exponentially. People kept asking me if I was nervous to leave without my family, and I continued to say no; I have been waiting for this my whole life.

Uncle Tony's impact on me has been developing my love for my Italian heritage. Most of my friends do not even know what their heritage is, and if they do, they have no appreciation for it; I wear mine on my sleeve. My favorite dish is macaroni and meatballs, my Spotify playlist is filled with Dean Martin and Frank Sinatra, and I can tell the difference between homemade sauce and store bought. Although my Ancestry test came back with only 3% Italian (obviously a scam), I know it does not matter what is supposedly in my DNA; what is my soul is what ultimately matters.

Recipient of The IHC Scholarship ... **AMANDA FIERRO**

An Italian person who has made an impact on me, was the surgeon who performed my first Tracheal Resection surgery. I was eighteen years old when I was diagnosed with a rare disease called Idiopathic Tracheal Stenosis, which means a severe narrowing in my Trachea.

I was blessed to have had an amazing surgeon by the name of Hermes Grillo, who performed my first surgery at Massachusetts General Hospital. Dr. Grillo was the son of Italian

immigrants who had gone to medical school and achieved great things. Without Dr. Grillo's vast knowledge, I would not be alive today. Since the surgery performed by Dr. Grillo, I have had many more procedures and have been going to MOH/ Mass Eye and Ear Infirmary in Boston since 1999. I can recall Dr. Grillo telling me that I might not have a voice after the surgery or that the best-case scenario I would sound like Marlene Dietrich. After we left his office, I had to ask my dad who Marlene Dietrich was. After my nine-hour surgery, I woke up with the voice that I have now. Sadly, a few years after this first tracheal surgery Dr.

Grillo was killed in a motor vehicle accident in Italy. He was in Rome to receive an international award for his work in the field of tracheal stenosis. To this day when I see new physicians, they are in awe when they learn I was a patient of Dr. Grillo. This is because he was the foremost expert of tracheal surgeries and a professor emeritus at Harvard Medical School and author of numerous textbooks.

My plan when I was in high school, was to go to a school in Boston and to become an orthopedic surgeon. After the surgery performed by Dr. Grillo in 1999, I knew my life was changed forever. I knew medical school was no longer in my future, but instead a career as a nurse would be my new plan. It took many years of procedures, treatments and surgeries before I was able to put my plan into action, but now at the age of 37, I am in an accelerated nursing school with Maine Medical Center and Saint Josephs College. This course is year-round and I am scheduled to graduate in May of 2021. I am currently employed at Maine Medical Center as a Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA). After receiving my Bachelor of Science degree in Nursing. I will stay at Maine Medical Center for at least three years.

I take great pride in my Italian heritage. I have taken a few different Italian language classes and have had the privilege of going to Italy on three different occasions. My family belongs to the Italian Heritage Center and we all help out with different events through the year. I run the registration desk at the Italian Car Fest and this year stepped up to take over my father's responsibilities in preparation for the


